Methodology

- > The study covers the top 14 districts with the largest number of returnees
- Data collection between March- April 2022, by Social Inquiry and IOM team
- Sample size is 2803 respondents; 95% confidence interval, 10% margin of error at district level



Key Findings

Safety:

95% of Returnees generally feel safe, however, societal conflicts are yet present 40% reported irreconcilable social divisions, 44% reported fear of a recurrence of violence

Services:

Returnees, at large, have access to public services, but service quality or quantity is insufficient,

78% reported the insufficient electricity, 64% reported the insufficiency of schooling and healthcare

Livelihoods:

Returnees generally could restore their pre-displacement businesses, but it is unstable due to the weak finance;

43% of the respondents receive government salary or pension, 14% are unemployed, 19% with an unstable income, 33% at the lowest level of purchasing capacity




SAFETY AND SECURITY


Most of the returnees feel safe and accepted in their community, but there is fear of the recurrence of violence

- ➤ 11% of returnees feel judged or discriminated against by the rest of the community
- ➤ 17% of returnees do not feel comfortable when accessing police or formal law enforcement
- ➤ Long term, 44% fear a recurrence of violence in the community

% returnees who feel their safety is not ensured




% of returnees who feel judged or discriminated by the rest of community






% of returnees who indicate irreconcilable social divisions among the community

Adequate Standard of Living

Standard of Living


Returnees generally reported having access to housing and public services, such as basic utilities, education, and healthcare

Nonetheless, the capacity of those services is limited


- 30% of households without sufficient water supply
- > 78% of households without sufficient electricity supply
- 62% of households faced issues with healthcare
- ▶ 64% of households faced issues with schooling



> % of returnee households without sufficient water supply




% of returnee households without sufficient electricity supply






% of returnee households who faced issues with receiving healthcare



% of returnee households who faced issues with receiving schooling






LIVELIHOODS AND ECONOMIC SECURITY

ACCESS TO LIVELIHOODS AND ECONOMIC SECURITY

Returnees generally report access to the labor market


- ▶ 14% unemployment in the district of return
- 19% unstable income sources
- 33% at the lowest level of purchasing capacity
- 10% were discriminated against in accessing the labor market








which of these sources of money does your family have at its disposal to get by at present?

Conclusion

- > Returnees are able to access essential services, but there are some structural barriers that prevent full or quality access and sustainability
- Returnees at their places of origin face challenges with **safety**, **public services**, and **livelihoods** which **impact their reintegration**
- > 66% of respondents feel that the next generation will not live better
- The report assumes that reintegration is not fully achieved and there are risks for some returnees to re-displace again



Reintegration Criteria

- Safety and Security
- Adequate Standard of Living
- Livelihoods and Economics Security
- Restitution and Protection of Housing, Land, and Property
- Personal Documentation
- > Family Reunification
- ➤ Participation in Public Affairs
- Legal Remedies and Justice
