Quantitative data collection occurred between March-April 2022 Sample 2803 (10% margin of error at district level)





II. Poverty & Precarity – A Comparison of Female- and Male-Headed Households in Districts of Return




The analysis details the differences in householdlevel characteristics (male and female HoHH), and what implications these differences have on durable reintegration.



V. Employment in the South of Iraq – Challenges Prospects for Women and Youth





Iraq recently went through ISIL conflict in the north, social movements, and popular demands for change were growing in the center and south of the country. Protests and demonstrations have increased since 2017 demanding a change. This brief explores feelings of marginalization through:

- 1. lack of confidence in institutions and their capacity to provide services,
- 2. Inability to economically prosper, and
- 3. Persistence of an insecure environment.

VI. Between Fragility and Resilience: and Explanation of Human, Social, Natural, Physical, and

It also discusses the capacity of the state to make citizens less vulnerable to violence, by providing services and by mediating relationships both between citizens and between the citizens and the state.


It explains the factors which affect individual and collective resilience and fragility through different capitals:
