







Displacement Overview

- As of 31 December 2024, DTM identified 1,031,475 IDPs (175,674 households).
- Decrease of 92,188 IDPs since the last year (-8%).
- The highest decreases in IDP numbers were recorded in Duhok (-24,223 individuals), Erbil (-20,575), Al Sulaymaniyah (-17,751) and Ninewa (-17,213).
- The decrease was primarily driven by camps closure, grants from the Ministry of Migration and Displacement (MoMD) and IOM Facilitated Voluntary Movement (FVM) programme.






Districts of origin

- Slightly more than half of IDPs originate from Ninewa Governorate (56%).
- The greatest decrease in IDPs is among those originating from Sinjar District (-24,325).

Recent movements

- There has been 8,797 new IDPs movements in this Round.
- Movements were primarily driven by:
 - IDPs arriving from another location of displacement – relocation (5,004) and secondary displacement (3,720)
 - Along with 73 individuals arriving from their area of origin after return failed return.

Return Overview

- As of 31 December 2024, DTM identified, **4,927,890** individual returnees (821,315 households).
- Increase of 64,818 individual returnees since previous year (1%).

IDPs from district

- The highest increase in number of returnees was in Ninewa and Salah Al-Din governorates (37,134 and 19,458 individuals, respectively).
- In Ninewa, closure of camps and the financial support through MoMD and IOM FVM programme helped encourage returns. In addition, many families returned to reunite with their relatives and benefit from improved public services or better economic conditions in their areas of origin. In Salah Al-Din, returns were driven by improved security and services, with some families returning after renovating their houses and others following security clearance approvals.




Data Collection Period: September-December 2024

The Return Index is a tool designed to measure the severity of conditions in locations of return through:

- Livelihoods and basic services,
- And safety perceptions and social cohesion.

• An increase of **5,289 returnees living in severe or poor conditions** has been observed since the round collected in September – December 2023, when the share of returnees in severe conditions was also 12 per cent (604,656 individuals).

Improvement of conditions

Between Round 20 (September – December 2023) and the current Round 23 (September – December 2024), the largest decrease in the number of returnees living in severe conditions was recorded in Diyala Governorate (6,090 individuals). The decrease in Diyala Governorate was mainly observed in Al- Khanaqin District (7,500 individuals).

Diyala Governorate

Khanaqin District

- Improved service provision in Markaz Khanaqin, Jalula and As-Saadia subdistricts.
- Better electricity supply and reconstruction of destroyed houses in As-Saadia and Jalula.
- Increased employment opportunities in Jalula due to market re-openings.
- Improvement in water supply.
- Reduced concerns about possible armed clashes.



Deterioration of conditions

Between Round 20 (September – December 2023) and the current Round 23 (September – December 2024), the largest increase in number of returnees living in severe or poor conditions were recorded in Salah Al-Din (7,902 individuals) and Ninewa (5,682) governorates.

Salah Al-Din Governorate

The most noticeable increase that was observed in Balad (7,542 individuals) and Al-Fares (5,346 Individuals) districts, mainly due to:

• The return of families from Ashti IDP camp in Sulaymaniyah to their place of origin located in these two districts, which are still experiencing severe or poor conditions.

Ninewa Governorate

Highest increases was in Al-Ba'aj (+6,426) and Telafar (+4,050) districts.

Al-Ba'aj District

Returns from Duhok camps despite poor services, jobs and water.


- Al-Qahtaniya: Slow recovery, uncleared mines, unresolved tensions.
- Markaz Al-Ba'aj: Limited jobs, ongoing security concerns.

Telafar District

Due to the residents feeling unsafe because of the increased presence of armed groups, other than local security forces at checkpoints, which raises concerns among residents about the potential for harassment.






Displacement Index Round 11 (September – December 2024)



- The Displacement Index (DI) is a tool designed to measure and monitor the living conditions of IDPs.
- The DI is based on 20 indicators across 5 domains: (1) livelihoods, (2) housing, (3) infrastructure and services, (4) safety and security and (5) social inclusiveness


- Out of the 2,486 displacement locations assessed in Round 11, 82 present severe conditions. These locations host 5 per cent of the IDP population or 48,504 individuals.
- A decrease of 7,746 IDPs living in severe conditions has been observed since September December 2023 (Round 8), when 6 per cent of the IDP population (56,250 individuals) were living in severe conditions.

Proportion of IDPs per category of severity by governorate of displacement per round




Subdistricts are classified as 'hotspots' if they score highly in terms of overall severity and have at least 1,000 IDPs residing in the subdistrict. Starting from this round, the list also includes subdistricts with medium overall severity and high score at least on one of the five domains. By applying mentioned methodological adjustment, more hotspots are identified in this round.










