### M&A Subgroup Updates

#### Co-Chairs Meeting (IOM and REACH) - March 2025

- Discussion on REACH's Transition: Reviewed the process for REACH stepping down and initiating the search for a new co-chair for the subgroup.
- ActivityInfo Data Collection Tool: Decision made to adopt the ActivityInfo tool for data collection.

#### Co-Chair Selection Process (IOM) - April 2025

- Invitation to Apply: Sent to M&A subgroup members, inviting applications for the co-chair position.
- Application Deadline: All applications must be submitted by 24th April.
- Monthly Meeting: Scheduled for 28th April to discuss the selection process and other subgroup matters.



### Monitoring and Reporting Guidelines for Durable Solutions in Iraq

- Partner Feedback: Feedback from partners, shared in January, was incorporated into the document.
- The primary objective of the document is to guide organisations in the systematic collection and reporting of data related to durable solutions for displaced populations.
- It covers a range of activities under the strategic objectives set by the DSTWG, including housing, livelihoods, documentation, basic services, social cohesion, safety, and security.



## Reporting Requirements

All partner organizations are required to submit reports on their activities related to durable solutions on a quarterly basis. The reporting periods are aligned with the calendar year as follows:

Q1: January 1st – March 31st

Q2: April 1st - June 30th

Q3: July 1st – September 30th

Q4: October 1st – December 31st

**Strategic Objective 2 - Housing and HLP:** Displacement affected populations have access to housing and security of tenure

**Strategic Objective 3 - Livelihoods:** Displacement affected populations have access to sustainable livelihoods and income

**Strategic Objective 4 - Basic Services:** Displacement affected populations have equitable access to basic services (school, health, electricity, water and social protection)

**Strategic Objective 5 - Documentation and Rights:** Displacement affected populations have access to personal and other civil documentation and have equal access to justice

### Update on government committees



On 28 November 2024, following the recommendations of the High Committee formed under Diwani Order 24261 on 7 February 2024, the Prime Minister established a specialized national team **chaired by the Deputy National Security Advisor**.

Representation from <u>federal</u> and <u>KRG</u> authorities.

Mandate: Developing a comprehensive plan for the return of displaced persons, including reconstruction efforts, in coordination with the United Nations in Iraq.

Timeline: The team, established under Diwani Order 24529, was given **90 days** to finalize its plan and is expected to request an extension to complete it in partnership with the United Nations.

### RCO update on Guidance on Internal Displacement Response and Solutions



#### Guidance on Solutions to Internal Displacement (2025)

This is the legacy document of the Piper mandate and now serves as the foundational reference for the UN system's work on internal displacement solutions.

- It emphasizes the centrality of government ownership and the RC/UNCT leadership role, supported by UNDP, UNHCR, and IOM as Solutions Champions.
- It introduces new institutional arrangements, including the Global Solutions Hub, the Solutions Fund, and the UN Solutions Adviser Facility, to ensure coherent, developmentanchored approaches.
- The guidance highlights the importance of quiet diplomacy, evidence-based planning, and inclusive processes that center the rights and agency of IDPs from the outset.
- The three principals of UNDP, UNHCR, and IOM are rotating chairs of this new arrangement.

### RWG workshop on access to safety and security



The RWG Team is planning to implement a one-day DS Technical workshop on Safety and Security In Baghdad on the first week of June. The agenda will include 4 main topics:

- No return Area
- Tribal Issues and Fear of Revenge
- Landmines and Explosive Remnants of War
- Freedom of Movement

RWG is still in the preparation phase, conducting meetings with different stakeholders involved in Durable Solutions.
